This component may be planned to be part of the internship Each student enrolled in 3 year course shall undergo an internship for minimum 12 weeks (20 weeks for 5 year LLB course) during the entire course under NGO, trial and appellate advocates, legal regulatory authorities, legislatures and parliament, other legal functionaries, market institutions, law firms, companies, local self government and other such bodies as the university may stipulate However, the internship shall not be for a period of more than four weeks continuously in an academic year

- Moot Court: Every student may be required to do at least three moot courts with **10** marks for each. The moot court work will be on assigned problem and it will be evaluated for **5 marks** for written submissions and **5 marks** for oral advocacy.
  - Observance of Trial in two cases, one Civil and one Criminal Students may be required to attend two trials in the course of the last two or three years of LL.B studies. They will maintain a record and enter the various steps observed during their attendance on different days in the court assignment. This scheme will carry **30 marks**.
  - Interviewing techniques and Pre-trial preparations and Internship diary. Each student will observe two interviewing sessions of clients at the Lawyer's Office/Legal Aid Office and record the proceedings in a diary. Each student will further observe the preparation of documents and court papers by the Advocate and the procedure for the filing of the suit/petition. This scheme will carry **30 marks**.
- The fourth component of this paper will be **Viva-Voce** examination on all the above three aspects. This will carry **10 marks**.
- e Student will be required to undertake legal awareness programme in association with N.S.S. and other authorities as directed by the Faculty.
